8TH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION
January 27, 2008**

The eighth annual congregational meeting of Community of Faith Presbyterian Church, Covington, Kentucky, was called to order by The Moderator, The Rev. Donald H. Smith, Jr., in the sanctuary at 12:06 PM on Sunday, January 27, 2008.

DECLARATION OF QUORUM (14): The clerk declared that a quorum was present.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES: ACTION: The minutes of the seventh annual congregational meeting of Community of Faith Presbyterian which was held on January 28, 2007, were approved as presented in the Annual Report, as were the minutes of special congregational meetings held on July 29, 2007, and November 4, 2007.

THE REPORT OF THE PASTOR: Reverend Smith asked for questions regarding his report printed in the Annual Report. **ACTION:** There being no questions, the congregation voted in favor of receiving the Pastor's Report.

THE REPORT OF THE PARISH ASSOCIATE: ACTION: A motion to received Dr. Ed McNulty's report with thanks was approved.

THE 2007 STATISTICAL REPORT & CHURCH ATTENDANCE: The statistical report presented in the Annual Report showed that on December 31, 2007, the church had 120 active members. Average attendance for services during 2007 was 53. **ACTION:** The statistical report was received by an affirmative vote.

REPORTS OF BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

Board of Trustees: President of the Board of Trustees, Roger Bell, spoke in reference to the Trustees' report recorded in the Annual Report. He described it as a "simple report that shows we spent more than we took in last year." He warned that the trust fund will be gone if we continue to spend. **ACTION:** A motion to receive the Trustees report was approved.

Board of Deacons - Howard Story, President: ACTION: A motion to receive the report from the Board of Deacons prevailed.

STANDING COMMITTEES: ACTION: The congregation voted to wait until all reports by standing committees were reviewed, then to receive all of these reports with a single motion. Committee reports reviewed at this time were: Christian Education, C.L.A.S.P. Site Committee, Evangelism, Fellowship, Mission/Mission Interpretation, Personnel and Administration, Property, Worship, and Long Range Planning. The following comments were made concerning these reports:

Elder Jim Berry, Chair of Christian Education, extended thanks to Dr. Ed McNulty for his help with the Lenten study on inclusion and the recent group study on spiritual longing.

Bill Lindsay, President of the C.L.A.S.P. Board, reminded the congregation that C.L.A.S.P. now has a Post Office box number and asked that members please send contributions to the box number since the mailbox outside the church is not secure. Contributions can also be sent to Jo Shade who is C.L.A.S.P. treasurer.

Floyd Hastings added The Sons of Dixie and Habitat for Humanity to the variety of organizations that meet at the church.

ACTION: The congregation voted in the affirmative to receive all of the Standing Committees reports.

THE BUDGET FOR 2008: Treasurer Gary Willis reviewed the 2008 budget, which was approved by the Session. He commented that the church is coming to the end of an era with the rapid depletion of the trust fund and said that the budget as we know it will be very different in 2009. He called for prayer for the leadership of the church, that we will work faithfully toward a transition.

THE DEACONS' FUND: ACTION: The Deacons' Fund report was reviewed and a motion to receive the treasurer's and the Deacons' reports was approved.

THE PASTOR'S TERMS OF CALL FOR 2008: Rev. Smith offered to leave if we wanted to discuss his terms of call in private. Since there were no objections to him remaining, the congregation proceeded to consider the terms that were essentially the same as they were in 2007. **ACTION:** A motion to approve the terms of call as recommended by the Session carried.

THE AUDIT COMMITTEE: Elder Bill Lindsay, Chair of the Audit Committee, reported that the books had been examined and had been found to be in good order. **ACTION:** The report of the Audit Committee was received by vote.

THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE: Elder Johanna Willis, Chair of the Nominating Committee, brought the committee's report. The names of Anji Hurt and Mary Lee Harrison were placed in nomination by the committee for the office of Deacon, Class of 2010. There were no nominations from the floor. Elder Willis then placed the names of Jack Kleier and Pete Beckett in nomination for the office of Elder, Class of 2010. In addition, Jean Jennings was nominated to fill Johanna Willis's two-year term, Class of 2009. Again, there were no nominations from the floor. Two more elders and two more deacons are needed for Class of 2010. **ACTION:** Nominations were closed and an affirmative vote was cast for the above elders and deacons.

The Nominating Committee was dismissed with thanks, and a new Nominating Committee was elected. Nominations for members from the congregation included Derek Beach, Al Jaeger, Carol Schomaker, and Bud McDermott. **ACTION:** A motion that nominations cease and that we elect these four persons by acclamation prevailed.

ACTION: A congregational vote and prayer by Rev. Smith served to close the congregational meeting and open the corporation meeting. The congregational meeting adjourned at 12:37 PM.

ACTION: Election of Trustees: Since the elders, Jack Kleier and Pete Beckett, elected as elders for the Class of 2010, are qualified to serve as trustees, these two were nominated and elected as trustees for the Class of 2010.

The corporation meeting adjourned at 12:38 PM. Rev. Smith closed the meeting with prayer.

THE PASTOR'S REPORT 2008

During 2008 many of the errant chickens came home to roost. What this means is that this was the year when the endowment went away and we had to look ahead to living within financial boundaries of the tithes and offerings from all of us. This meant that many very painful decisions had to be made. Many meetings were conducted in order to present the best possible information to Session in order to enable this body to make faithful decisions based on those data. At present we have "bought" ourselves some time and look forward to 2009 to put into place some of the changes approved with an eye toward continued mission and ministry in the name of Jesus Christ.

In preparing this report I reviewed monthly reports as well as my calendar. I was amazed at the number of things that happened during the course of the year. I remember the Presbytery Cluster meeting in January, the Triennial Visit from the Committee on Ministry, the Ice Cream Social, the wild and crazy Talent Show, the Drama Group gatherings, and preaching through an interpreter to the Chin Calvary Baptist congregation. How could we forget Cincinnati's Know Theater production of *This.is.America* in our social hall? Wow! Professional theater in our Social Hall!

I was at worship 45 Sundays, Maundy Thursday, and Christmas Eve. Dr. Ed McNulty was able and preach on those Sundays when I was in Nicaragua (2/3 and 2/10 plus Ash Wednesday), or at a continuing education event (5/4) or vacation (6/1, 6/8 and 12/28). I know, it only adds up to 51. Remember that we cancelled services on March 9 because of snow and icy roads.

In response to concerns raised during a congregational talk back in June 2007, we planned scheduled and conducted three studies in spirituality including *The Holy Longing* by Richard Rolheiser and *The Power of Forgiveness* a study of the topic that was provided by Ed McNulty. I am particularly grateful to him and to my wife Patti for the opportunity to work together with them in preparation of these opportunities. Ed also graced us with his study of Christian art from various times and places in the world with his *From the Catacombs to the Silver Screen*, from which he drew on his extensive collection of slides, pictures and artifacts during September and October.

I continue to teach the Adult I Class. We completed the Book of Revelation (God won!) and on January 11, 2009, will begin a new study of the Deuteronomic history from I Samuel thru II Kings, with help from the Hebrew prophets and occasional side trips into the Books of Chronicles.

I continue ex-officio to serve on the CLASP Board of Directors.

In addition to her gifted leadership of our choir and music program, Joanna Bailey began a drama group which performed during worship twice during the last half of the year most recently being a careful reading of The Lord's Prayer by the group.

For the presbytery I continue to serve as vice president of the Board of Trustees. Throughout 2008 I met on Wednesday mornings with the Council of Urban Pastors and put together a couple of luncheons for the Northern Kentucky Presbyterian ministers.

During 2008 I also served with People Advocating Recovery, Northern Kentucky Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance, Fairness Pastors, and Kenton Co. Community Corrections.

During the year I made 139 visits and saw some of you in the hospitals 82 times. (Now that I mention it, some of you saw me in the hospital!) I make sure at each session meeting that I have elders to accompany me when it is time to take communion to those who cannot worship with us. There were 18 such visits during 2008.

We welcomed Kelly Montana, Kathy Bergman, Krista Roy, and Jimmy Beckett as new members of our church. We said our good byes to members Richard Jennings, January 10, Charles "Butch" Reed on March 21, and Nellie Allene Mills on March 25.

I conducted weddings for: Keith Bales and Jennifer Tyler on May 31, Theophilus Gipson, Jr. and Monique Shannon on August 9, Anthony Haley and Danielle Milton on September 26, and Brandon Brock and Rachel Setters on October 11.

In addition to those members (above) I also conducted funeral services for Angela Renee Fugate, February 9, (w/ Ed McNulty), Howard Gaskins (Linda Lavelle's father) April 24, and Oudone Douangasa, an old friend, July 12 (in Louisville, Ky.)

During January, Session voted to cut our eight year ties to the AMOS Project.

At the end of January, Roger Bell, Bill Lindsay, Dawn Ramsey, Mark Bowen and I, along with Mark Lee and Ed Ramsey from Madisonville, KY First Christian Church (Disciples) left for Nicaragua. We provided sewing supplies and material for our partners to continue to make free school uniforms for families of children too poor to afford them. We spent several days with our partners in San Carlos doing work, worship and friendship. We visited non-governmental organizations in Managua including CEPAD and Los Quinchos, and managed to find some time to visit San Juan del Sur, on the Pacific coast.

In May I completed Interim Minister's Training (Phase I) in St. Louis.

A couple of years ago I said something about making a labyrinth for prayer and meditation on the lawn in front of the building. In the spring of '08, Bart must have heard me. Largely through his efforts we now have such a thing which, despite the effort of the local deer population, continues to stand tall. I know that I and others owe Bart a debt for his good work.

On Wednesday afternoons from September through November I conducted confirmation classes resulting in Krista and Jimmy uniting with the church.

In October we found the ways and means to lease space to a Burmese congregation who now worship at 2:00pm Sundays in the sanctuary. These Christian sisters and brothers are ethnic, religious, and political refugees from their homeland. I am proud that we were able to find them a home to worship. They began worship here on October 19.

This has been a longer than usual report, but I cannot end it without a note of sadness over the passing the Rev. J.V.C. "Bing" Summerell, a great friend of this church and a mentor of mine. Jack, Bill, Becky, Patti and I attended Bing's funeral in Louisville on November 8. Bert told us that he had planned the service himself (like we wouldn't have guessed!).

He is missed.

Many years ago I met with Bing when it looked like I was going to be the candidate for the pastorate of Covington, First. He told me that the staff here was exceptional. Despite the fact that in the 12 plus years between that time and this, the staff has changed some, it remains at least exceptional. I am grateful to Ed, Joanna, Daesik, Patricia, and Gary along with the many that help keep this place clean. Please accept my thanks for your good work.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES 2008

The Trustees worked very hard this year and accomplished many important goals.

After several false starts with organizations who wished to utilize space in the building, the sanctuary was leased to the Calvary Chin for their Sunday services. A standard lease had to be created and was approved by Session for continued use. In addition, a policy was adopted to streamline any requests to use the building by an outside person or organization. Also, agreements with other organizations using the facility were reviewed.

In addition, a comprehensive wedding policy and information document was developed after a great deal of debate and brain-storming. It was approved at the January 2009 Session Meeting.

The lock box was inventoried and moved to the Huntington Bank Ft. Mitchell branch as the Ft. Wright branch had closed. A listing of the contents was filed in the Church Office.

As members know, the contract for the janitorial service was cancelled and member volunteers stepped forward to clean the church building.

The Trustees provided assistance with a comprehensive cost cutting proposal, as well.

The President would like to thank all the Trustees for convening meetings early and participating in lengthy meetings other than their regularly scheduled monthly meetings. The Trustees worked on many difficult and controversial documents amiably, even when faced with differences of opinion. Dealing with church finances, physical plant, and policy is a difficult task and the Trustees did so with graciousness and brave honesty. The entire group was a great example of the work that can be accomplished when the participants are respectful, honest, and compassionate.

DEACONS REPORT FOR 2008

Sunday, February 24, 2008 meeting was held to discuss and take action on the following:

- * Nominated and elect a new Deacons Moderator. Howard nominated Jo Shade. 2nd by Bart. Passed unanimously. Bart volunteered to keep the minutes. Emille volunteered to be back-up minutes-keeper and to help coordinate disbursements of the Deacons Fund.
- * Assignment of Deacons to Church Committees: Jo Shade-Personnel; Bart Groeneveld-Worship; Emille Walden-Nominating; Howard Story-Property; Art Brophy-Property; David Weitzel-Fellowship; Anji Hurt-Fellowship; Freda Carlin-ChristianEd; Mary Lee Harrison-Mission; Lynda Jaeger-Mission. Deacons with no committee assignments: Mike Roy, Dolores Gaddis. Need a volunteer for Outreach.
- * Discussion about Deacon's Fund: Ending balance as of today is \$1,000.66, according to the Church Treasurer's Report. As a reminder, it was brought up that funds up to \$150 may be disbursed by the Deacon Moderator or the Pastor in case of immediate need. Disbursements over \$150 should be brought before the Deaconate (as represented by the Moderator and one other member) and coordinated with the Pastor. A minimum balance of \$100 should be kept in the fund at all times. All disbursements should be reported at the next scheduled Deacons meeting.
- * Clarification on meat trays for funeral families: Discussion led to a decision that two meat trays, plus bread are usually sufficient. Anji is willing to coordinate ordering and delivery up the meat trays. Wal-Mart appears to have an economical option of about \$35 per tray.
- * Christmas Poinsettias: Howard will continue to coordinate purchase of the poinsettias and delivery to shut-ins by Deacons.
- * Reduction of Deacon Classes: Discussion on the current size of the Congregation led to a motion by Jo to recommend Session reduce (by attrition) the required size of Deacon Classes from four (4) to three (3). Seconded by Bart. Passed unanimously. It was agreed that one Deacon (Usher) is sufficient to man the Sanctuary door prior to the service but four Deacons would still be needed to collect the Offering. Thus, small adjustments in Deacon duties may be necessary to accomplish all Deacon functions during Worship, to be determined.

Sunday, April 20, 2008, meeting was held to discuss:

Howard clarified the duties of the Closing Deacon and listed the following: 1) Ensure thermostats in the upstairs school building are set at 60 degrees (winter) - one in the connecting hallway and one in the parlor. 2) Lock school building door. 3) Put everything away from the coffee fellowship time: rinse coffee carafes, store sugar & cream, store or trash leftover snacks, wipe hall serving table. 4) Collect and clean water glasses (3) from Sanctuary. 5) Check pews for trash and leftover Bulletins; check that hymnals and bibles look orderly. 6) Ensure all school building and Narthex windows are shut. 7) Turn off all lights. Bart will edit the current guide sheets to reflect the clarifications.

Also a reminder for the Door Deacon to make the attendance count (include nursery) and enter that into the attendance book which is kept in the Narthex cabinet by the main door.

Looks like the standard service offering envelopes are in short supply in the Sanctuary. Freda will remind Patricia to order an additional supply.

Sunday, December 14, 2008, meeting was held to inform the Deacons of the decision by Session to discontinue financial aid. Those requesting help will be advised that COF members deeply regret we can no longer provide this assistance.

The meeting was closed with prayer.

Current Strengths and Opportunities

Christian Education continues to have strengths and opportunities as it strives to contribute to the spiritual growth and talent development of our congregation. Some of our strengths were:

- Sunday school classes:
 - o Sunday school for children and youth, taught by Becky Lindsay and her volunteer “teachers on call,” consisting of Roger Bell, Erika Berry, and Linda Hils
 - o Three adult classes met weekly. Adult 1 (taught by Don Smith) participated in a continuing Bible study, centered on Revelation for most of the year; Adult 2 (taught by Bill Lindsay, with various other assistant teachers) studied contemporary topics, most recently the Tribal Church, focusing on building an intergeneration community of believers ; and Adult 3 (taught by Floyd Hastings) which has been studying world religions.
- CLASP, an independent 501c(3) organization, ministering to students after school in Ludlow
- Teacher recognition Sunday, which was observed in June
- Development of a drama group, for “teaching” during worship services
- Two topical studies, including Richard Rolheiser’s Book on *The Holy Longing* and another on *The Power of Forgiveness*. were taught weekly by Don
- Parish Associate Ed McNulty taught a series, entitled “From the Catacombs to the Silver Screen” on Christ in the arts

Under the new “umbrella” structure, there are likely to be future needs for reaching visitors, inactive members, and others, which will impact Christian education.

Opportunities over the coming year may occur in as many as six areas:

- Provision for parents who bring infant and toddler children to church
- Development of a multigenerational Sunday School class for parents with grammar school-aged children
- Assisting in training members in order to develop their gifts
- Increasing participation of youth in studies and active involvement in worship services
- Development of new member classes taught by lay leaders and Don
- Partnering with other churches or college agencies in areas of youth work, possibly including outreach to college-age and young adult singles and couples

None of this would be possible without our volunteers, teachers, and Parish Associate. Special thanks must also be extended to our committee members, including: Carol Alverson, Joanna Bailey, Freda Carlin, and Becky Lindsay. Don Smith, as always, lends a hand as ex-officio member.

CLASP ANNUAL REPORT 2008

With God's help and dedicated volunteers and staff, CLASP has completed another very good calendar year of 2008. There has been a full complement of students throughout the year, with total enrollment fluctuating between 35 and 40 students. As of the end of 2008, there are 36 students, with 2 on full scholarships.

Our staffing, which is critical to the quality of the program, is stable. Melodie Corbett, is our outstanding director. She and Lisa Brownfield, have provided daily program leadership. Becki McKenzie performs her custodial duties, our attendance monitor is Barbara Atwood, and Angie Betz is our aide.

Funding for the program comes from parent fees, on-going support from our sponsoring churches, foundations and organizations, and numerous individual contributors. This year, we have been fortunate to have obtained new contributions from two foundations, one fraternal organization, a partnership grant, and three fund-raisers. Sharon Heck, our lead fund-raiser, has helped achieve outstanding results. Two foundations and a trust, the Durr Foundation, the Butler Foundation, and the Virginia B. Hunnicutt Trust have given substantial grants. CLASP partnered with the Golden Rule Masonic Lodge on their Valentine Dance. A mission partnership grant of \$2500 was received from the Presbytery of Cincinnati. Lakeside Presbyterian Church's held fund-raisers (Souper Bowl and Lakeside Ministry Group) and contributed some \$1800 in total. A spaghetti dinner, planned by Jack Kleier, Mel Corbett, and Lisa Brownfield netted almost \$900. Totaling \$9900 in "special" fund-raising, this is a new high for us. Other financing has come from about 200 friends who gave approximately \$13000 throughout the year.

The Kroger gift card and Remke card programs have helped to support CLASP. A value equal to 4% of the Kroger purchases made with the special CLASP-Kroger gift card is donated to CLASP. These programs have netted \$2000 this year for CLASP.

CLASP volunteers are essential to our success. Our sincere thanks go to all of them. We are blessed with our faithful board members, many of whom are "hands-on" in day-to-day CLASP operations, as well as being administrative leaders and decision-makers. We also have a number of others who come from Community of Faith, Lakeside, and Crescent Springs Presbyterian churches. We are especially grateful for the enthusiastic support of Rev. Don Smith, Rev. Chris Torrey, and Rev. David Ealy, who regularly lead the devotionals and participate in special CLASP programs and celebrations.

Sandy Thornton, a long-time board member and volunteer is stepping down. Officers for the fiscal year, through June, 2009, are Board chair and Treasurer, Bill Lindsay, Vice-Chair, Jerry Hinners, and Secretary, Sharon Heck.

MISSION COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 2008

The early church recognized the need to reach out to those in need and the church has been involved in outreach mission ministry ever since.

Again this year, this Congregation participated in the four special offerings of the General Assembly. Even though we did not emphasize these Offerings as we have in the past, the Congregation still responded generously to them.

STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN REPORT FOR 2008

In August the Mission Committee requested of the Session to launch a Stewardship Campaign for the purpose of presenting a proposed budget and soliciting pledges to fund that budget for 2009.

A committee consisting of Jack Kleier, Marilyn Gordon, Bill Lindsey, Al Yeager, and Rev. Don Smith began meeting and put together a campaign. We worked closely with the Budget Committee and the Long Range Planning Committee to prepare a proposed Budget and a goal for the Campaign.

The Theme, "Today, Tomorrow, and Tomorrow" was adopted. The fact that the trust fund would not last through another year at our rate of spending, was taken under consideration, along with the realization that we could not continue to fund our staff at the present level of spending. A goal of \$149,999.99 was set for the proposed budget.

We planned a series of 10 house meetings and one general meeting at the church to cover the congregation by zip codes. There were to be eight to ten people per meeting. Materials were prepared and copies of the budget were ready for discussion as well as any other question that was asked. Teams were gathered to do the presentations. Only two house meetings and the general meeting at church were held. Commitment cards were passed out and people were asked to return them on Stewardship Sunday in November.

Although we did not reach our goal of \$149,999.99 the fact that the number of pledging units increased made the campaign a worthwhile success.

A budget of about \$120,000 will be presented for 2009. Cuts will be made to staff hours and pay. We have begun to do the cleaning work in the building on a volunteer basis. There is much hard work ahead of the congregation for 2009.

The Good News is that God isn't finished with us yet.

The building sees use five days a week when forty children come for two hours each day. Although it is over 100 years old, it is still in pretty good shape. We invite you to pay us a visit any day during the school year between 3:30 and 5:30.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT FOR 2008

Bart Groeneveld was asked to help with Worship Committee affairs for the second half of 2008. Carol Alverson was instrumental in pushing the committee to be more active. Other members included Matt Hastings, Dawn Farwick, Joanna Bailey and, of course, Rev. Don Smith. Thank You to Patti Smith for her input and insight.

There were three meetings of the committee during the second half of 2008. Although scheduled to be monthly, conflicts did arise and meetings postponed. Meetings were held August 24, October 5 and November 9.

The meetings generated what the committee hoped would be enhancements to make the worship service more interesting, relevant and meaningful to the congregation.

The structure of service as it applies to music was a principal topic. Johanna Bailey has been able to implement several interesting and effective changes to the way music is part of the service, especially the kind of music and alternative instrumentation. Thanks go to a number of musically inclined members of the congregation and, of course, Mr. Cha, in making it happen.

Explanatory notes in the Bulletin were developed and well received; these help expand the meaning of each section of the service and help newcomers and veterans in explaining the structure and meaning of the service sequence. The order of events during the service has been adjusted slightly and that process is still ongoing; the goal is a smoother-flowing service.

There will be a written set of instructions to pass on procedures for preparing the Elements of Communion to future persons performing this task. They will be kept on file in the church office for reference. Thanks go to Matt Hastings for this.

Still in progress is development of advance scheduling and notification of Elders who have duties during the Communion service; the idea is to develop a (perhaps quarterly) schedule. This way, this duty is mostly automatic and Elders can plan on their participation.

A decision was made that it would be appropriate for children in the nursery area to participate with the Communion service in the Sanctuary, at the discretion of their parents.

A major change was a decision to adjust the Christmas Eve service from 11 pm to 8 pm. The committee believes the new time gave certain advantages to those seeking a Christmas Eve opportunity to attend a Service. Although somewhat controversial, the move appeared to be well received based on attendance of the Service, estimated at 45.

The Worship Committee thanks all those that expressed interest and opinions for guidance and hope such input will continue.

LONG-RANGE PLANNING TASK FORCE 2008 ANNUAL REPORT

The Long-Range Planning Task Force had three areas of focus during 2008 – 1) developing a working set of guiding principles – in the form of mission, vision, and value statements, 2) reviewing and recommending the board structure and simplified “committee” structure of the church, and 3) recommending a set of “action planning” priorities that would serve as a catalyst for the work of the Future of the Church Task Force and the work of the Mission Committee on the 2008 Stewardship campaign.

In October, the work of the LRP Task Force culminated in the following motions that were presented and passed by the Session:

Motions

1) The LRP task force moved that the values, mission, and vision statements be adopted as the ones that currently express who we are, whom we serve, what we value, and where we intend to grow in the foreseeable future as a Community of Faith, recognizing that God can and does intervene in the plans of humans, where God wills.

2) The LRP task force moved that the session and diaconate be reduced over the next two years, or fewer, to nine members each, beginning with the class of 2009 for each body. This motion, was passed by the session, and approved by vote of the congregation.

3) The LRP task force moved that the session adopt the “umbrella” organization, to begin in January. The restructuring features a three-part structure of administrative, congregational care, and mission groups that will oversee the areas that previously called for standing committees. The advantage of this organization will be to reduce meeting time, promote effectiveness, and require delegation to, and involvement of, more non-officer church members.

4) The LRP task force moved that the session adopt the 5 areas for action planning as priorities to begin in 2008 and continue in 2009 with planning and implementation under the proposed new umbrella structure. While not meant to be comprehensive, the task force suggested that high priority action plans must be made (many are already under way) and carried out, in the near future, for:

- Stewardship through committing:
 - Time
 - Talent
 - Treasure

- Inviting spiritual seekers and promoting discipleship through:
 - Nursery enhancement
 - Children’s and teen classes
 - A young adult class
 - Training session members

- Systematic congregational care through:
 - Contacting younger church and family members
 - Showing concern for, and staying in contact with, the elderly and shut-ins
 - Prayer chain organization and use

- Regular meetings of “Tribal” house groups (building on stewardship meeting structure)
- Leadership training (church officers’ retreat in January) and cost effective publicity development (including reintroducing a church website)
- Administrative planning and action to reduce operating costs

Values, mission and vision

Values, mission and vision are the “guiding stars” that help us to remain on course as we work together as a church. If we can agree on who we are, who we minister to, and where we intend to head, people will want to join us in worship, work and play.

Values

Our values are a list of the most important characteristics and concerns that make us unique as a body of believers in Christ. After considerable discussion we arrived (separately and almost unanimously) at this list:

- Community - togetherness and neighborhood(s)
- Music
- Life-long learning
- Openness - especially to diverse individuals and groups
- Peace and justice
- Environment and sense of place
- Mission vehicles or conduits - CLASP, Presbytery, and Nicaragua

Mission

What is our mission, which we carry out through the conduits, above, and how do we express our values to those that God calls us to serve? Our mission statement is designed to answer the question of: **to whom, and for what, are we a Community of Faith?** In other words, it is meant to tell about who we serve, and what we strive for. This statement was what we arrived at, after more discussion:

We exist as a Community of Faith in order to worship God, tell the Good News of Jesus Christ, and love and nurture all with whom we come in contact. We do this through our openness and welcoming all God's children, inviting them to become Christians, and challenging them to become salt and light to the world as they strive to reach their God-intended potential.

The mission is a statement for the long-term, indefinite future. We may not want, or need to, change that long-term statement for ten or twenty years (if then), but we need something more tangible to strive for, in the short-to-medium time frame. The Bible says, “without vision, the people perish.”

Vision

We must have a vision that incorporates our values, but also gives us a tangible glimpse of what the future church may look like, if we really work hard and seek God’s help to make it happen. This vision, in our deliberations, took the following form:

Our vision is to become a transgenerational, inviting, multicultural church that is faithful to our mission to tell and live the Good News in local, regional, and international settings in such a way as to become a true community of faith. We strive to develop our gifts of openness to all, of caring for our congregation, of inspiration through worship, of ministry through music, of love of learning, of care for our environment, and of joy in serving those who are in need.

As the moderator of the Long-Range Planning Task Force, I wish to thank our committee members and those who have supported our work. Members are: Joanna Bailey, Roger Bell, Miguel Carlin (“virtual” member via e-mail communication), Jack Kleier, and Don Smith.
