Note from the Pastor

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Jeff and I just returned from vacation that we enjoyed very much. It was different, though—as most of you know, Hurricane Matthew had developed in the Caribbean and moved across Haiti, Jamaica, Cuba and up the eastern coast of the United States. We left on vacation knowing it was possible we'd have to leave early, and that's exactly what happened. On Wednesday morning we packed up and retreated to the Smokey Mountains, where the weather was beautiful and there was no chance of our vacation being further disturbed!

We did continue to watch the storm, however, and see the damage that was left in its wake. Haiti, still recovering from the earthquake that happened several years ago, was hit very hard;

homes were destroyed, crops ruined, and over 800 people are reported dead. Other parts of the Caribbean didn't receive quite as much damage, and in the US flooding was the biggest problem; still, lives were lost and disrupted and some will never be the same again.

The tendency to blame God for these natural disasters goes far back into ancient times. Terrible storms, droughts, earthquakes and so forth were often seen as punishment for sin or signs of an angry deity. The randomness of destruction and devastation make it difficult for us to process what has happened; as it says in Matthew, the sun rises for the good and evil and rain falls on the just and unjust. don't pick and choose who they hurt; but in our broken humanness we want someone to blame, perhaps so that we don't have to blame ourselves. So we might blame God, or we might blame those "sinners" over there for bringing down the wrath of God. Anything to keep ourselves in the clear.

God came to love the world in the person of Jesus Christ. Jesus represents the best of humanity and the love that God

has for humanity, all wrapped up in one package. On the cross, Christ represents the pain of the world; raised from the cross Christ represents the healing of that pain. We are no longer overwhelmed by the pain in our own selves or in the world; therefore we no longer have need to justify ourselves. We ourselves are justified and aligned with God's plan for the world through Christ.





Their immediate need of course is fresh water. Cholera is a very real and dangerous threat that leads to great loss of life. Haiti will need major outside help in order to survive.

Hurricane Matthew came up our East Coast and hit many cities hard in Florida, South Carolina, Georgia, and

North Carolina. You will be hearing more about this in the months and weeks to come. The Presbytery will be asking for volunteers to go to some of these places to help people rebuild and reclaim their lives and dwellings. Birth of a Nation

Rated R. Running time: 2 hours. 1 Peter 2:18; 1 Samuel 15:3; Isaiah 61:1

The Nat Turner Slave Rebellion took place 185 years ago, but as Nate Parker's powerful film shows, it is still very relevant to today. Thousands of black Americans have been staging their own rebellions against police shootings of black males, with this time many whites joining in their demonstrations for justice. The first half of the film graphically deals with the horrors of slavery, as well as the gross way in which the whites used the Bible to keep slaves submissive. Nat Turner learned to read the Bible for himself, after which his master hired him out to other slave owners to preach a gospel of meekly submitting to their chains. The film is the story of Nat gradually learning that other parts of the Bible taught a very different view, one that would lead to his explosive but short-lived rebellion. It is ironic that the family

name of Samuel Turner is today remembered only because of his slave's daring to stand up to his tyranny. A film that *every* American should see!

Rated PG. Running time: 2 hour 4 min. Proverbs 19:17; Luke 4:17-18

If you are looking for a feel-good film that is not cloyingly sweet, this Disney film is it. Set in the Ugandan slum of the title, it is the true story of a preteen illiterate girl who joins a church-sponsored chess club and rises to the top. Like its many sister sports films, it is a tale of the underdog taking on the world. It is also a fine mother/daughter story. It is good to see the church and faith depicted in such a positive way outside the faith film genre. And you don't have to know much about chess to enjoy it.

Rated PG-13. Running time: 1 hour 28 min. Proverbs 21:26; Jeremiah 22:13a; Luke 12:15.

The true story of what happened when in the Gulf of Mexico, the oil rig that gives its name to this film caught fire and created the greatest

oil spill in history. British Petroleum officials, wanted to cut corners, so they nixed a test of the system and insisted that it go on line so that they could recoup the drilling expenses. Many men lost their lives in the fire, but fortunately a nearby ship rescued most of the men in time. A thrilling story of bravery, the film also is a prophetic indictment of corporate greed that created a huge amount of environmental damage as well as the loss of lives.

Rated R. Running time: 2 hours 14 min. Proverbs 23:23. Amos 5:10.

You might want to change your opinion of this man so vilified by our government officials. The documents that Edward Snowden revealed that they had been violating the US Constitution by their spying on the emails and telephone calls of Americans and even of numerous foreign heads of states. And lying to Congress about it, the latter which, according to Snowden, motivated him to steal and turn over the thousands

of documents to a team of British journalists. This real-life tale of a whistle blower (?) or traitor (?) is far more thrilling than the dozens of fictional spy dramas that have been drawing crowds for years.

Rated R. Running time: 2 hours 4 min. Proverbs 3:31.

Ben Affleck plays a CPA whose extreme case of autism has made him a math savant. His unpretentious strip mall office south of Chicago is a front for his laundering the money for numerous international drug kings, arms dealers, and dictators. Two Treasury Department agents are on his trail, as well as an assassin hired to protect a discovery the CPA has uncovered at a corporation manufacturing artificial limbs. A typical thriller (lots of killings by guns and martial arts moves) made interesting because of the autism of the main character. We root for him but cannot admire him.

Warren Beatty starred in, directed, and co-wrote this 1998 political satire about a US Senate campaign in which a disillusioned decided to end his seemingly useless life by getting an acquaintance to hire a killer to assassinate him. Faced with death, he starts telling the truth about the cor-

ruption in politics caused by tons of money being given to the candidates, Crowds start to admire him for his truth telling, and he also falls in love with a beautiful volunteer. He now wants to live, but his go between is in the hospital suffering from a coma. How can he call his death off? One speech about obscenity is especially powerful in this funny take on politics which, sad to say, is still relevant 20 years after its release.

MISSION FAIR—OCTOBER 30 IMMEDIATELY AFTER CHURCH


