Reading Between the Lectionary Lines

Reading Between the Lectionary Lines Today and next Sunday we continue in Mark's gospel, following Jesus as he ministers to the people of Galilee. Our passage today is what we call a "Markan Sandwich"-- one story wrapped around another story. Today we read and heard in the sermon about Jairus' daughter and the woman with the hemorrhage, while next week's passage, Mark 6:1-13, deals with Jesus' rejection in Nazareth and the sending out of the 12 in pairs (more about that next week.) Again we find that these two passages are side by side in the gospel as well as being back to back in the lectionary; so instead of reading between the passages we can look at how they might be connected. I will be writing more about this in my blog this week, which you can find at www.cofnky.wordpress.com or by going to the website (www.cofnky.org) and clicking on "Pastor's Blog."

Some things to ponder this week:

- 1. Notice the contrast between the way people react to Jesus in the stories up to now (throngs of people! Awe and wonder!) and the way his hometown receives him. Why do you think there is such a difference?
- 2. Compare how his hometown reacts with the way the Gerasenes reacted in Mark 5:1-20. Notice the pattern in our passages up to now (including our RBLL passages): faithful people being healed (the man at the tomb), then a rejection (the Gerasenes). Faithful people being healed (Jairus' daughter and the woman with the hemorrhage), then a rejection (by his hometown.) What point do you think Mark is trying to make here?
- 3. What questions come up for you as you think about the life of Jesus at this time? What can we learn from them for our lives and our church community today?

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
