Reading Between the Lectionary Lines

Today's readings come from Mark 6:30-34 and 53-56—so we notice right away that a lot is left out! Mark 30-34 features the return of the disciples, an attempt by Jesus to draw them away for rest, and a crowd so large and miserable that Jesus can't leave them. Mark 6:53-56 closes out the chapter as well as this section of Mark that we've been reading through. What we skip over, though is quite interesting.

Mark 6: 35-44 is Mark's version of the feeding of 5000 people. Because Mark's gospel is believed to have been the first one written, we might ask why Mark includes this story. It is another miracle, but different than ones he's performed before, which were miracles of healing. (Even driving out demons is a form of healing, isn't it?) The other kind of miracle is the calming of the storm, which speaks to Jesus' authority over creation. But what about this feeding miracle? Is it another healing story or a story about Jesus' authority? Or something else?

The second story to look at is the story of Jesus walking on the water. Jesus sends the disciples away ahead of him in the boat, then later approaches the boat across the water. The disciples think it is a ghost; they are surprised that it is Jesus because, the text says, they didn't understand about the loaves.

Why does Mark include this story here?
What do you think it means that the disciples hearts were hardened?

Has Jesus every surprised you, and how did you feel about that? What would it take for us to fully and wholeheartedly believe in Jesus and his power and authority?

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
